

Pet Therapy

What is pet therapy?

Pet therapy, also referred to as animal assisted therapu, is a kind of therapu that uses pets as a form of companionship and treatment. The aim of therapy could be to improve an elderly person's emotional, social, or cognitive abilities.



How does it work?

We work with a variety of local companies to bring animals into our homes in a safe and enjoyable way for residents, these include: Zoolab for reptiles and creepy crawly-type sessions; Encourage Activity for the softer animals including rabbits, guinea pigs and birds; and Gorton Donkey Sanctuary recently did a mini roadshow around our homes.

We also have several home pets. For example, Meadway Court have a cat, Max. Wellcroft have two Guinea Pigs, Ant and Dec. And Bamford Close have a cat called Smudge.

We would always encourage our residents to maintain a relationship with a much-loved pet, whether that's bringing the pet in to visit or even moving a pet into the home. Please speak to a Home

Manager directly to find out if this will be possible for your family member.

Why is it good for elderly people?

- · Encourage and motivate residents to stay active and get more exercise
- Improved ability to reminisce
- Increased self-esteem through carina for a pet
- Increased social interaction
- Reduces depression
- Reduces anxietu
- Reduces loneliness

Our residents have been making the most of the wonderful weather and getting out and about to enjoy new experiences outside of their homes.



Over at Cawood House, our residents are enjoying some well-deserved R&R thanks to a top of the range spa bath.

The Reval Transcare is a highly versatile bathing system and is designed for people with reduced posture and mobility. The verticalraise side door allows easy access and the high-low function prevents the risk of our staff getting back strain. The Transcare system also has a unique tilting function, which allows our less mobile residents to semi-recline while fully immersed neck deep in water.

The spa bath also has HydroSpa, AromaSpa, ColourSpa and AudioSpa sensory treatment options, enabling residents to benefit from massage, colour, music and aromatherapy while enjoying a warm, relaxing bath.

One resident, Margaret Fox, who suffers from Aphasia



and finds it difficult to speak, enjoyed her bubble bath so much, when staff came to turn it off she shocked everyone around her when she said, "switch it back on".

Heart-warming stories like this are the reason we keep looking to invest in technology and new ways to make lives easier (and clearly enjoyable!) for our residents.

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DAY in the LIFE

of Joanne Morris



How did you first get into Care?

When I was younger my mum worked at Cheadle Royal Hospital. From the age of 14, I used to go in during the holidays to help in Occupational Therapy, or help on the ward my mum was working on. This usually involved making lots of cups of tea and talking with the patients. At the age of 15, having enjoyed helping out at the hospital, I went to a residential care home for my school work experience. It was an amazing experience and I even ended up getting paid for most of it! I never looked back, and the rest, as they say, is history.

When did you start working for **Borough Care?**

Back in March 2004. I joined Reinbek as a Care Supervisor although now we call the role Senior Care Assistant.

What has been your career progression with Borough Care?

I went from a Senior Care Assistant to an Activities and Lifestyle Facilitator. I've always loved getting involved in the activity side of care and when the position became available, I knew it would be the perfect job for me.

How do you kick start your day?

My alarm goes off at 7am, I then have to wake my son followed by a very strong coffee, before getting ready for work.

What is the first thing you do when you arrive at work?

Say hello and good morning to all the residents and staff; find out if there's been any changes with any of the residents overnight; make another strong coffee (I'm not addicted.. I promise); check my emails.

What is the favourite part of your day?

Bedtime with a hot chocolate and a good book. It has to be a crime thriller!

What are you most proud of in your home?

We recently opened The Bamford Inn, Bamford's very own pub! It was such a team effort to get it open and looking as good as it does. Our residents and their guests are already getting plenty of use

What do you find most challenging?

It can be difficult to get residents to take part in activities, although it's funny, once they're taking part or after we've got back from a trip, they always say what a good time they had. Juggling a family and busy job, like every working mum out there, I always wish there were more hours in the day.

Do you have a story or anecdote to share with us?

I could probably write a book if I'm honest! We recently took some of our male residents to the pub at Manchester Airport for lunch and to watch the planes. We had a wonderful day and got to see the Emirates A380 take off over us. The following day, John, one of the residents who came along, said: "Here's my girl. I had the most amazing day yesterday and I can't stop thinking about it." To me it was a simple trip but to him it meant a whole lot more. What can be more rewarding than that!

What's the last thing you do before leaving work?

Tidy up; check my emails; and say goodbye to residents and staff.

What are you looking forward to in your career?

After 27 years working in care, I can honestly say, I am the happiest in my work I have ever been.

What piece of advice would you give to someone coming into the care profession?

Treat the residents you look after in the same way you would care for your mum or dad. Also "if in doubt, ask!" It's never failed me!
